## Ngā Korero Tātaki

THURSDAY 18 JULY, 6-9PM, FREE

Ngā Korero Tātaki is an evening lecture focused on innovative research, design and viewpoints related to our moana with keynote speakers Carin Wilson, Associate Professor Paul Kayes with Dr. Michael Kearney and Kaumoana Ema Siope with Hana'lee Waionu. Join our guest lecturers for this evening of stimulating korero on environmental sustainability, the application of traditional knowledge and an indigenous worldview on innovative responses to our marine environment.

'Sailing the great ocean of Kiwa' - Kaumoana Hana'lee Waionu (Ngati Kahungungu) and Ema Siope (Ngati Hāmoa) share their experiences of crossing Te Moana Nui a Kiwa (the Pacific Ocean) and the revitalisation of Polynesian navigation and sailing throughout the Pacific.

Associate Professor Paul Kayes and Dr. Michael Kearney (Te Whare Wānanga o Awanuiārangi) - Contemporary examples of iwi environmental management; including an investigation into the impacts caused by the grounding of the CV Rena in Tauranga Moana, and a study into tuna (eels) in the eastern Bay of Plenty.

Designer Carin Wilson (Studio Pasifika) – Mātauranga Maori design solutions for whare waka wānanga space with Hekenukumai Busby, illustrating how the design of the Waka Hourua (voyaging canoe) continues to influence the conception of the land-based space as an extension of the voyage.
