From our Co-Chairs

It was quite a year! We are proud of the way the organisation pivoted to respond in a COVID-19 environment – managing to still deliver a full programme. We need to especially acknowledge our kaimahi (staff), including our Kaiwhakahaere Matua (General Manager), for all the work they achieved in such a complex environment.

We welcomed two new kaitiaki to our Tangata Whenua caucus and one into our Tangata Tiriti caucus this year. Their contribution has and will continue to ensure that our mahi contributes to more equitable outcomes for tangata whenua and the sector.

And we are proud of what was delivered in the past year, especially one of our most popular webinars, *Implementing Mahi a Atua as a service response*. We also presented on the challenges and opportunities for Māori recovery in a COVID-19 environment.

Last year our increased Pacific focus also saw some excellent webinars. We're especially proud of the 'round the kava bowl' series, as well as beginnings of co-creation of a Pacific strategy.

We also created a useful resource for the sectors we serve by way of *How to Make a Webinar*. And we began providing a technical service to run webinars for other organisations. Indeed, we've increased our value as a sector capability-building organisation. There's more to do: Our own *Outcomes Harvesting* evaluation told us that you want further innovation and action – we intend to deliver.

Looking ahead, as a Treaty-based organisation, we have committed to exploring the next stage in our Te Tiriti o Waitangi journey. We will be re-engaging with the tangata whenua sector – to listen and act on their aspirations. We also look forward to sharing our whakapapa, to inspire the community and voluntary sector in our own journeys as Treaty partners.



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2020/2021 FOCUS AREAS

1. Pacific webinars, strategy and engagement

We reimagined our webinar platform and engagement with Pasifika by honouring Pacific ways of knowing and doing. In November 2020, we invited local Pacific researchers and knowledge holders to two fono held at AUT in Tāmaki Makaurau and ACE Aotearoa in Whanganui-a-Tara.

The talanoa around the kava bowl was an opportunity to explore the definition of community research through a Pacific lens, to connect and to share experiences, and start to grow a collection of Pacific knowledge with Community Research. From this engagement, we ran a series of webinars called the Kumete Kakala Hour – a circular space for sharing and connecting. Community Research began creating our Pacific Strategy to guide our future mahi with Pasifika.
